Stroke and Cardiac Care Reach New Heights

Thanks to the generous support of our donors and expertise of our physicians and care teams, Methodist Hospital continues to save lives and provide exceptional cardiac and stoke care to the community. In 2021, we:

- Received recertification as a Comprehensive Stroke Center.
- Earned the American Heart Association's Get With the Guidelines Stroke GOLD PLUS with Honor Roll Elite Plus achievement award.
- Purchased a new, state-of-the-art biplane system for one of our three Cardiac Catheterization Labs.
 Physicians began training to use the new system in February 2022. With this leading technology our second biplane system our physicians have one of the most advanced tools available to precisely diagnose and treat stroke, as well as treating clogged arteries and installing pacemakers.
- Continued to treat cardiac and stroke patients despite the pandemic, and encouraged patients not to delay or defer care because of COVID-19 fears with an extensive community awareness campaign called, "It's Safe to Seek Care."
- Went the extra mile for cardiac patients whose family were not permitted to visit during COVID surges. Our nurses provided emotional support to fearful, isolated patients and used technology to connect them with loved ones.

ED Delivers Top Care

The Hollfelder Emergency Care Center at Methodist Hospital responded effectively and continuously to the needs of our patients and community in 2021, despite the challenges of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

As new information and variants taxed leadership and staff, they continued creating best practices to combat the pandemic, focusing on the well-being, health and safety of patients, physicians and associates.

"As health care workers, we have all been through disaster drills in the past and many of us have been through situations where we've cared for patients after catastrophic events like an earthquake, fire or chemical exposure," said Carlos McCormack, Executive Director of Emergency Services. "This pandemic, at times, seemed like a catastrophic event with no end."

"We recognize and thank our entire Emergency Department team for all of their heroic efforts during the pandemic," Carlos said. "They were all amazing, caring, compassionate individuals who did everything in their power to provide quality care to our patients during extremely difficult circumstances."

The ED treated more than 41,000 patients in 2021 - a 5% increase over 2020 due in part to the "Safe to Seek Care" campaign urging people not to delay necessary care because of pandemic fears.

The center invested in rapid PCR testing so caregivers could accurately determine who was COVID-positive in just 15 minutes. The COVID-19 positivity rate of patients tested in the ED declined significantly in 2021 with only 8% testing positive.


At the same time, forward-thinking planning meant the Hollfelder Emergency Care Center never suffered staffing shortages, even during the pandemic's worst surges. This in turn meant that the overall average time between a patient walking into the Emergency Department and being treated by a physician, physician assistant or nurse practitioner was 25 minutes.

Part of this success can be attributed to the generous support of Methodist Hospital Foundation donors, particularly members of the Club 300. This annual giving program of \$300 or more directly benefits emergency services at the hospital.

"The challenges and sacrifices were unbelievable," said Carlos. "I'm incredibly proud of my teams; they knew what they had to do, and we continued to provide the best possible care. It wouldn't have been possible without the unwavering support and trust from our donors. Thank you."

COMMUNITY OUTREACH TEAM Pivots Quickly to Meet the Region's Health Information Needs During Pandemic

One of the many areas where donations supported the hospital in 2021 included providing needed funds to educate the public through the efforts of our Community Outreach team.

This placed the hospital in a true dilemma: How can we continue to engage the community and share information – especially at a time when health care advice is vitally needed by the community?

"Getting health information out to the community and connecting people with hospital services is our number one goal with all of our outreach activities," said Fei Huang, Manager of Community Outreach for Methodist Hospital. "Our lectures are typically held monthly at the Arcadia Community Center with an audience of anywhere from 50 to 125 participants. When we could no longer meet in person because of the pandemic, we came up with a new way to reach people."

Amazingly, the hospital staff pivoted quickly to using online conference calls for support groups, as well as with many of the physician lectures sponsored by the hospital and the City of Arcadia. In fact, the hospital began posting the free lectures live as webinars on Facebook and found an even larger audience than the previous in-person lectures.

In 2021, the Community Outreach team of Fei Huang and Tracy Chen overcame the in-person restrictions on gatherings and participated in 27 events — including co-hosting 15 virtual healthcare lectures with the City of Arcadia featuring Methodist Hospital medical experts. Each webinar garnered from 60 to 200 people, or an average of about 155 people per lecture.

In addition, hospital-sponsored classes for Labor & Delivery care, Diabetes Education, as well as the Stroke & Brain Injury Support Group all moved to conference call gatherings and were able to continue meeting with patients.

Longtime Hospital Supporter CH Hsueh Leads By Example

Longtime Methodist Hospital donor Chang Huan Hsueh — know by nearly everyone as "CH" — loves to travel to remote regions of the globe. The more far-flung and obscure, the better, CH says.

"You can learn from different people, different cultures," he explained. "It opens up our vision."

An avid outdoorsman who enjoys hiking, horseback riding, backpacking, river rafting, canoeing and ocean kayaking among his pursuits, CH credits the care he received at Methodist Hospital for saving this important aspect of his life.

"In 2016, I was on a trip to Scotland and England with my wife and we were hiking a lot," he recalls. "The last week of our trip, my leg started to swell. When we left London to come home, I needed a wheelchair to get through the airport."

Doctors diagnosed the problem as a severe infection that led to surgery and a week in Methodist Hospital's Critical Care Unit.

"We were so worried that it was some type of cancer, or maybe a flesh-eating bacteria," said CH. "There was no injury, no obvious cause. They finally concluded it was a virus or a parasite," possibly acquired during previous travel to India and Cambodia.

"I spent two or three weeks in the hospital, and then took antibiotics for six weeks at home," he said. "I did physical therapy to get my strength back. I had to learn how to walk again because all of the muscles in my leg were damaged. I'm very lucky.

"I'm so very thankful for all the people at Methodist Hospital, the nurses, the doctors, the specialists," CH continued. "They put me back to normal. I'm still able to do all my outdoor activities." CH was first introduced to Methodist Hospital when he and his wife Haily moved their family to San Marino from the San Fernando Valley 22 years ago. Back then, CH and his business partner were running a thriving U.S. shoe import business, from which he's now retired.

"When we moved to San Marino, I had some friends who lived in the area, and one of them knew I liked to support good causes," CH said. "She suggested I join the Methodist Hospital Foundation. That's how I started to get involved."

At that time, Methodist Hospital was already serving the San Gabriel Valley's growing Asian population. But CH noticed that there didn't seem to be as many Asian physicians. "I thought we should solicit more Asian doctors to be involved with Methodist Hospital, to bring more patients into the hospital and to serve Asian patients in a language and culture that was familiar," he said. "And through the years, we have seen that accomplishment."

Throughout his involvement with Methodist Hospital, CH has – and continues to – contribute generously to the hospital in myriad ways. He served on the Methodist Foundation Board from 2006-2014. During that time he co-hosted the Crystal Ball and served on both the Crystal Ball Committee and the Asian Outreach committees.

CH's many charitable contributions include support for Mardi Gras, the Crystal Ball and other events. He also pledged \$250,000 to the 2009 capital campaign, has contributed to the Stroke Care fund, and in 2020 gave generously to the COVID-19 employee assistance fund.

In the early days of the pandemic, when many hospitals faced critical shortages of face masks that were nearly impossible to obtain, CH secured a large donation of masks for Methodist Hospital. The Foundation is grateful for CH's generous and giving spirit, and so appreciative that he's willing to help whenever there is a need.

Today, CH enjoys spending time with his children and grandchildren, as well as managing, with his brother, a foundation in Taiwan established in memory of his late father. Known in English as the Love and Hope Foundation, the organization supports early childhood education and promotes the social welfare of preschool aged children in remote, mountainous regions of Taiwan. CH travels to Taiwan each year with the foundation's CEO to support fundraising efforts, strengthen partnerships with other organizations, and help coordinate local resources.

Back at home, CH urges others to get involved with Methodist Hospital. "Methodist Hospital is a good hospital, but providing the best services to the community is very costly," he said. "We need everyone to support the hospital, so we can buy the most updated medical technology, continue to improve equipment, and keep providing the best quality care."

Hyperbaric Oxygen Treatment Makes Dramatic Improvement

After surgery and radiation for jaw cancer in 2016, Al Meymarian developed a pseudomonas infection in his jaw that would not heal. This type of infection is often mild in healthy people, but for others it can be life-threatening.

"I took antibiotics for six weeks but this did not work," said Al, 85, who lives in Altadena with his life partner Jennifer Lewis. "I was switched to another antibiotic for another six weeks, and it was a little better but not completely healed." That's when his doctor suggested treatment at Methodist Hospital's Hyperbaric Oxygen (HBO) Chamber.

"The treatments in the HBO chamber were lifesaving for me," Al said. "This was a very tenacious infection. It's hard to say what would have happened if the oxygen therapy had not been available."

Al underwent a total of 50 treatments, or "dives," so called because the pressure in the oxygen chamber is the equivalent of scuba diving down to 40 feet. Today, the infection is gone and Al is back at his part-time job tasting wines for Mission Wine and Spirits in Pasadena.

"My experience in the chamber was absolutely positive," Al said. "You're there for about an hour, and they have a TV set up for you, you can sleep, whatever you want. The chamber is plastic, and you have plenty of room to see. It was not claustrophobic at all. And they're always asking how you're doing. They're there all the time monitoring. Every morning when I drove to Methodist Hospital I was looking forward to the chamber, believe it or not. How many people look forward to going to the hospital every day?"

Jennifer appreciated the caring both she and Al received from the hospital's caregivers.

"The first few times we went it was nerve-wracking, because we didn't know what to expect," she said. "They let me sit in a chair right outside the chamber, instead of in the waiting room, so I could be right there with him and give him some comfort. I was very impressed with how well we were treated and how much I appreciated their warmth and support."

Al is happy to hear the hospital is raising funds to purchase a second chamber.

"There was never any down time with the chamber," he said. "There was always someone ahead of me when I went for treatment, and always someone in the waiting room when I came out. It would be nice if they had more chambers, that's for sure."

HBO WOUND CARE: From Hopeless to Healing

Most minor cuts and scrapes heal on their own with a little care. But what if you have a wound that doesn't heal as it should? Hyperbaric oxygen (HBO) therapy is a unique type of care for non-healing or difficult to heal wounds available at Methodist Hospital.

"By greatly increasing the oxygen concentration in body tissues in the HBO chamber, this stimulates the growth of new blood vessels in areas of reduced circulation and improves healing time," said Anne Villarama, Director of Physical Medicine at Methodist Hospital. "HBO treatments also increase the efficiency of white blood cells to kill bacteria and aid in infection control."

Patients are placed in a sealed, pressurized HBO chamber where they breathe pure oxygen to treat wounds such as:

- Diabetic wounds
- Skin damage caused by radiation treatment
- Skin grafts or surgical flaps that are not healing
- Bone infections that don't respond to antibiotics
- Crush injuries from accidents
- Carbon monoxide poisoning
- Other serious conditions, including flesh-eating bacteria

Methodist Hospital's first hyperbaric oxygen chamber was installed in the Outpatient Pavilion 10 years ago, thanks to a gift from the H.N. and Frances C. Berger Foundation. But the need for this care is so great that the hospital is now embarking on a fundraising initiative to purchase a second chamber. The estimated project cost is \$1 million.

The current chamber has a maximum volume of four "dives" a day or 20 dives a week. Treatments in the chamber are called dives because the pressure is the equivalent of scuba diving down to 40 feet. Most patients wait at least four to six weeks to begin treatment, and sometimes as long as three months. Although urgent patients can sometimes be worked into the schedule more quickly, others are forced to seek care elsewhere.

"When patients have to wait for this therapy, it affects wound healing," Anne said. "Meanwhile, they continue to suffer from their symptoms and risk infection. The purchase of a second chamber would decrease wait times and optimize clinical and functional outcomes, while increasing patient satisfaction and decreasing the likelihood that patients will seek care at another facility."

The contributions of Methodist Hospital supporters will help us meet this critical need for the community. "This treatment is life-changing for our patients," Anne said. "The come in feeling helpless and hopeless and finish treatment with a positive outcome. It's why I come to work every day."

Crystal Ball Celebration Sets Fundraising Record

Guests were thrilled to be back in person for the Methodist Hospital Foundation's 32nd annual Crystal Ball at the Pasadena Convention Center on Oct. 9. The hospital is now exploring the purchase of a new Da Vinci surgical robot and construction of a Hybrid Operating Room with the proceeds. A Hybrid Operating Room enables surgeons to perform minimally invasive complex procedures, and can instantly be converted into a standard operating room when needed.

Methodist Hospital of Southern California and Keck Medicine of USC recently submitted formal written notice of their proposed affiliation to the Office of the Attorney General of California for regulatory review and approval, which is expected to occur by mid-year 2022.

Following the parties' acceptance of the Attorney General's conditions of approval, Methodist Hospital will officially join Keck Medicine of USC and the USC Health System as USC Arcadia Hospital.

"Our discussions with USC on the affiliation have given us full confidence that we will operate stronger together," said Dan Ausman, President and CEO of Methodist Hospital. "We remain wholly committed to the San Gabriel Valley community, and plan to expand residents' access to highly specialized care in the years to come."

Methodist Hospital will be part of an integrated delivery system which will enhance the hospital's ability to recruit and retain physicians, while expanding local access to health services.

Under the affiliation, Methodist Hospital will:

- Remain a full-service community hospital
- Retain local governance
- Expand scope and access to services such as neurology, cardiology, cardiac surgery, and urology
- Continue to improve quality of care
- Attract the "best and brightest" physicians and staff
- Keep the local hospital Foundation intact with all gifts past, present and future benefiting Methodist Hospital and its core services

Thankfully, that did not stop the WIN ladies, or the fundraising efforts to support our nurses.


